# Westminster Foundation for Democracy (WFD) briefing on democracy: January 2024



## **Summary**

- Democracy is under threat and needs strengthening everywhere. Data shows that global freedom is declining and in their recent report, the World Economic Forum identified misinformation and disinformation as the most severe risk the world is facing.
- In 2024, countries home to more than half of the global population will hold elections in a year that could prove a tipping point for democracy around the world. Elections to watch are listed on the second page of this document.
- Electoral integrity is pivotal. Electoral integrity boosts institutional legitimacy and trust and leads to more stability and better governance.

### What is at stake?

- Democracy is under threat and faces strategic assault from autocrats.
   International IDEA's November 2023 report highlighted declines in representation, rights, and the rule of law the world over.
- The World Economic Forum <u>identified</u> misinformation and disinformation as the most severe global risk anticipated over the next two years.
- Democracy helps drive prosperity and security: <u>Evidence shows</u> that democracy

- helps protect rights, reduces the risk of conflict, and increases the likelihood of sustainable economic growth and effective social policies.
- Action is needed to protect and strengthen democracy at home and abroad.
- The UK Government white paper on international development acknowledges the challenge of autocratisation and that strong democracies underpinned by strong institutions support sustainable development.

## **Elections = democracy?**

- Elections are one of the most visible elements
  of democracy and its one of its essential
  ingredients. The right to vote is a human right.
  But holding elections alone does not always
  mean democracy. This year, Belarus, Russia,
  and Iran will go to the polls in elections that are
  unlikely to be free or fair, offering a veneer of
  legitimacy to regimes that are in fact autocratic.
- Electoral integrity is pivotal: Electoral integrity extends beyond voting day and the credibility of the outcome – it is built on inclusion, transparency, and accountability throughout the entire electoral cycle.
- Electoral integrity is important because credible electoral processes boost institutional legitimacy and trust in representatives. This leads to more stability and better governance.
- Credible elections help make sure everyone gets to have a say in how their society is run and has the chance to influence change for the better.
- Electoral integrity is best supported through broad, long-term governance programmes that address challenges throughout the electoral cycle. WFD supports electoral integrity globally through analysis, research, and election observation missions.
